Can you help the Zooniverse? (All ages)

The Zooniverse is the world's largest and most popular platform for people powered research where you can assist professional researchers from around the world by working on projects with them. You don't need any specialised training, background or expertise to take part in and you can con-



tribute to real academic research at your own convenience and on your own computer. You'll be able to study authentic objects of interest gathered by researchers, like images of faraway galaxies, historical records and diaries, or videos of animals in their natural habitats thereby helping to contribute to our understanding of our world, our history, our Universe and more. There is a vast amount of projects you can join in a range of disciplines such social sciences, space, natural history, language and climatology.
